JOURNEY ARRANGED

I followed Sgt. Swanson out of the ship and opened my chute almost immediately.

On the way down I lost my heeled shoes and flying boots. Thinking that I was about to land in a tree I crossed my legs as I had been taught to do; but at the last

moment my chute swung me and, missing the tree, I broke my leg in landing.

~~I~~ hid my chute and crawled

and hopped to the edge of the forest in which I had landed. It took me from 1430 to 2030 hrs to go about four miles.

Then I came to a small farmhouse where I knocked at the door. The people who answered my knock recognized me and took me in at once. They fed me and called a doctor, and from this

house my journey was arranged.

- a) ~~At~~ At the end of March or beginning of April 1944 the RAF raid on a village near ESBLY which the Germans had taken over demolished the place and killed some 2000 Germans. (Hearsay, April 1944)
- b) The Gare de l'Est in Paris was demolished by the bombing of 17 April 1944. It was still ~~closed~~ out of use seven weeks later. (Observation) At this time (end of May 1944) only AUSTERLITZ, ST. LAZARE, and one other station in PARIS (possibly the Gare de Lyon) were in operation (Hearsay, end of May 1944).
- c) In DAX about 12 June 1944 it was said that travel from PARIS to the south of France was impossible, not only because of the disruption of the railways by sabotage and bombing but also because of the strictness of German control both on the railways and the roads.
- d) In May 1944 the diet in PARIS save for those who could afford the black market was restricted to bread and potatoes and ~~and~~ the population as a whole was even then desperately short of food. (Observation and Hearsay) The Germans
(next)

were entering theatres and restaurants and cutting off sections of the metro without warning, rounding up all males regardless of age and ~~without further question~~, and shipping them off to Germany. (Hearsey, May 1944). Curfew in Paris was 2300 hrs, and any male apprehended on the streets after that hour was arrested and shipped to Germany ~~without further consideration~~ (Hearsey, May 1944).

- e) In PARIS and other cities if a German was ^{killed} shot the Germans no longer bothered to take hostages but shot indiscriminately ^(and on the spot) any men found in the streets. (Hearsey, May 1944)

Suggestions: Escape photographs carried in the ~~colophane~~ ~~packet~~ ~~commonly~~ ~~used~~ are likely to stick together and so be rendered useless.

French people told me, that Pilot, Co-pilot, & TOP TURRET GUNNER were not found in plane.

Did source examine the wreckage of the plane? If so, what was its conditions?

Yes - Badly Damaged.

If the plane crashed in water how far was the plane from land and what means was source rescued and what life rafts, wreckage, etc., remained on the surface that would have assisted other personnel to keep afloat.

Did not know much about them only that they were not found in plane.
